We have friends who have made several missions trips to Myanmar and have become good friends with a local pastor. Here are some excerpts from a letter they received shortly after the recent military coup.

I would like to place a prayer request before you for urgent needs in our country Myanmar.

Myanmar had been ruled by a military junta for over five decades (1962-2011). ...All kinds of violence against human fundamental rights that one could possibly imagine, was done to innocent citizens and civilians across the nation by the military.

In the 2011 national election, the military junta's successor party called Union Solidarity and Development Party (USDP) won a landslide victory and ruled the country until 2015. This was the period where Christians in Myanmar faced severe political and religious persecution... Freedom of speech and religion was experienced only a little.

When the national election was again held in 2015, the Nation League for Democracy party... won a landslide victory. That was the time and year that true democracy dawned on Myanmar; the citizens burst out in joy... During 2015-2020, citizens of Myanmar irrespective of color, religion, language and ethnic group enjoyed freedom of speech and religions to the max in our history.

But as a very unexpected thing happened in political arena of Myanmar early this morning where the military regime has once again taken control over the government in coup... (H)umanly speaking, we don't know what our future hold, how Christians will move on as there will be restriction of religious freedom and speech. According to the Open Door statistics of persecution for 2020, Myanmar stands in number 18. From current political point of view, things seem uncertain, but one thing we are sure about is Jesus is still our King. He is sitting on His throne and He has the final say. Nothing happens to us without His knowledge and permission. And this is our great comfort and assurance.

Kindly uphold us in your prayer. Pray for God to intervene in our political situation. Pray that peace, not bloodshed will prevail in our nation. Pray that all those arrested political leaders will be released soon safely. Kindly pray for Christians in Myanmar that we will not be disheartened or dismayed, but remain strong in Christ and move forward in our pilgrimage with joy and boldness knowing that God is in control.

The military dictatorship has announced nationwide curfew, and the internet, phone line and TV channel are cut off again and again...

Thank you for your prayer and concern. May God bless you all!

FAMILY MATTERS

Answers to your questions...

Although my spouse and I both work, it seems as though our family is always short of money. Are we doing something wrong?

ANSWER:

Charles Spurgeon once remarked, “You say, ‘If I had a little more, I should be very satisfied.’ You make a mistake. If you are not content with what you have, you will not be satisfied if it were double.”

Here are a few suggestions to address budget and spending issues.

Separate self-worth from possessions, including money. Self-worth is knowing you’re loved regardless of what you have or do.

View money as a tool and necessity, not as a joy producer. Consider money

not as a source of happiness, but as a resource entrusted to you from God.

Recognize that cutting expenses can be adventurous, even fun. Look for simple, no-cost pleasures, like a long, romantic walk, or a night watching a movie or sports at home.

Expect to grow in the process of cutting expenses. Realize that lean times can bring about significant personal and marital growth. Know that the ultimate result will be maturity.

Forgive the failures and develop trust. Without trust and a sense that both spouses are making sacrifices, it’s difficult to undertake cost-cutting.

And it is important to start with a budget as well. Consider these ideas:

1. List all necessary expenses, separating the “wants” from the “required.”
2. Plan your menus in advance, looking for specials; plan your dining out in advance, as well.
3. Avoid shopping without a purpose. If you do go browsing, make a commitment not to buy anything during the trip.
4. Use the Internet to comparison shop.
5. Plan errands so that time and gas are not wasted by backtracking.
6. Buy a used car instead of a new one.
7. Use the public library.

HOW IMPORTANT IS INTEGRITY TO YOU?

I encourage you to remember two men. The first is “Easy Eddie,” a lawyer for notorious mobster Al Capone, who ruled Chicago in the 1920s through crime, political extortion and murder. Eddie was as corrupt as they come.

All that changed the day his son was born. Eddie began to set positive examples and raised his son to do what is right. Eddie took integrity so seriously that he risked his life to provide authorities with information that put Capone in prison.

The second man to remember is Lieutenant Commander Butch O’Hare, a fighter pilot in World War II. O’Hare Airport in Chicago is named after him. His most famous flight occurred on February 20, 1942. He was the only defending pilot in the air when a wave of Japanese bombers attacked his ship, the *Lexington*. He single-handedly dispensed with the bombers and saved his ship. And all the men on it.

It’s possible that Butch learned great courage from his father, Eddie O’Hare—“Easy Eddie” O’Hare, that is.

Proverbs 28:6 says, “Better is a poor man who walks in his integrity than a rich man who is crooked in his ways.”

Godly character does what’s right . . . even when it costs us.

a person who strongly prefers having a plan and knowing what to expect, and all the year's plot twists were throwing me for a loop. I felt as if I had become a pro at expecting the unexpected. However, every time the year threw another curveball, it turned my insides to Jell-O.

In the grand scheme of things, my morning wasn't awful. The weather was perfect. The sky was clear and blue, and I felt strong enough to conquer the seven-mile hike I had planned through the national monument. Everything was meeting my expectations. Well, almost everything.

A friend of mine worked at the monument over the summer. My week had been brutal and I just needed a good friend to shine some sunlight and perspective into my day. However, when I arrived at the visitor center, my friend was nowhere to be found. My heart sank into my boots.

Disappointment stole the wind from my sails. Suddenly, the trail I had so looked forward to exploring didn't hold the same intrigue. I wanted to pout like a kid in the backseat whose parents just drove past the ice cream shop. It wasn't like me to feel so discouraged. What was the deal? 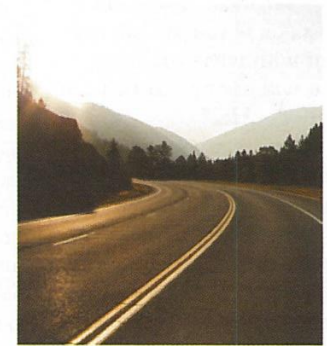

When he came to Jesus under the canopy of night in search of meaning, our Savior said to him, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

If you want to develop your children into devoted followers of Jesus who genuinely love all races of people, plan a road trip down Route 316.
